



APEC SINGAPORE 2009: FIRST SYMPOSIUM ON APEC SUPPLY CHAIN CONNECTIVITY TO SET FRAMEWORK FOR GREATER PHYSICAL CONNECTIVITY ACROSS APEC ECONOMIES 16 – 17 MAY 2009, RAFFLES CITY CONVENTION CENTRE

Singapore, the Chair of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) meetings for 2009, will be jointly organising with Australia a symposium on Supply Chain Connectivity from 16-17 May. Held at the Raffles City Convention Centre, the Symposium will bring together some 120 government officials and logistics experts from the APEC region to identify policy impediments to the flow of trade.

- This APEC Supply Chain Initiative (SCI) is expected to deliver an action plan to enhance the seamless flow of goods and services across entire supply chains. For the first time, it will look at policies from a holistic point of view, viewing logistics as an important enabler of trade. When put into place, the SCI will be a major milestone for the APEC region, providing the impetus to strengthen cross-border supply chain flows, connect markets, and enhance regional competitiveness. Such conditions will allow APEC economies to position themselves better for the economic recovery, by improving efficiency and reducing transport and logistics costs. This initiative is in line with the APEC 2009 theme "Sustaining Growth, Connecting the Region" and Singapore's priority of accelerating regional economic integration.
- During this two-day event, the 120 representatives from the government, business, and academia, will identify key chokepoints in the existing supply-chain system, determine priorities, and recommend policies to be considered by APEC Leaders when they meet in Singapore at the end of the year.
- The keynote addresses will be delivered by Singapore's Minister for Trade and Industry, Mr. Lim Hng Kiang and Mr. Anthony Byrne MP, Parliamentary Secretary for Trade, Australia.

About APEC

The Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) is the premier forum for facilitating economic growth, cooperation, trade and investment in the Asia-Pacific region.

APEC is the only inter governmental grouping in the world operating on the basis of non-binding commitments, open dialogue and equal respect for the views of all participants. Unlike the WTO or other multilateral trade bodies, APEC has no treaty obligations required of its participants. Decisions made within APEC are reached by consensus and commitments are undertaken on a voluntary basis.

Since its formation in 1989, APEC has grown to encompass 21 members spanning across the four continents and is representative of the most economically dynamic regions in the world, accounting for approximately 40 per cent of the world's population, half of world trade and more than half of world GDP.

The 21 APEC Member Economies are Australia; Brunei Darussalam; Canada; Chile; People's Republic of China; Hong Kong, China; Indonesia; Japan; Republic of Korea; Malaysia; Mexico; New Zealand; Papua New Guinea; Peru; The Republic of the Philippines; The Russian Federation; Singapore; Chinese Taipei; Thailand; United States and Viet Nam.
